AI in the library supply chain webinar

SCONUL's AI working group held a webinar on 18 September around AI in the library supply chain. The webinar focused on the implementation and integration of AI technologies in library services, with presentations and discussions on AI chatbots, metadata enrichment, staff training, and ethical considerations. We heard from Dr Sandra Tury, Associate Director, Online Library Services at University of London, who shared insights on the AI chatbot implemented at Senate House Library to support distance learners. Elly Cope, Head of Access and Acquisitions, and Alison Hazelaar, Access and Acquisitions Manager for Metadata and Discovery at University of Leeds introduced the University's initiatives in using AI for metadata and discovery services. This is a tool for libraries to amplify, enhance and evidence their role and impact in digital transformation, as well as ensuring the recognition of library and information professionals' expertise. It offers a library focused perspective on the established [framework for digital transformation in higher education](#) and highlights how library and archive services contribute meaningfully to institutional change across the six key areas of the framework: organisational digital culture, knowledge creation and innovation, knowledge development, knowledge management and use, knowledge exchange and partnerships, and digital and physical infrastructure. Survey on AI Applications in Libraries

The Centre for Digital Scholarship at the Bodleian Libraries, University of Oxford is conducting a survey on AI Applications in Libraries. They are seeking input from library professionals across a wide range of institutions and technical backgrounds. All experiences with Artificial Intelligence (AI) or Language Models (LM) in libraries are valuable – from extensive engagement to no direct experience. They are especially interested in insights into how library professionals are approaching, experiencing, and viewing the application of AI and LMs in conducting, supplementing, or supporting institutional library work. The results of this research will inform the Bodleian Libraries' decisions and will also be shared with the wider library community. OfS proposes revised Teaching Excellence Framework to drive up quality

The Office for Students (OfS) is consulting on a new quality assessment system that would provide students with a clear view of the quality of teaching and learning delivered by every registered university and college. The OfS propose integrating some of their quality assessment activities and the Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF), which would rate every university and college on its quality of education on a cyclical basis. These ratings would come with strengthened incentives for institutions to improve students' experience and outcomes. JISC has published a report, *[Small Language Models for libraries and computational humanities: Practical opportunities and use cases for academic libraries and computational humanities researchers](#)*. The report signposts effective work with language models, especially small models, in collections-based humanities research. The key findings section suggests practical activities to help practitioners make good decisions about using AI in university research. The Boston Library Consortium (BLC) has published a report on *Evaluation Criteria for Resource Sharing Software*. This report details the ongoing efforts of BLC's ILL Systems Evaluation Working Group to develop a set of comprehensive and extensible practitioner-driven criteria to evaluate library resource sharing software and investigate the functionality of current options on the commercial marketplace.
