Anna Vernon, Head of portfolio, content licensing at Jisc, gave an update on progress in the negotiations that Jisc is leading on behalf of the sector. She highlighted the next generation open access approach being taken which aims to deliver in-year reductions, financially sustainable agreements and more inclusive participation in open research. SCONUL has set up a new group as part of its set of directors' groups on managing change named after Italian cities and the new Turin group is open for heads of service who want to network and share information informally and confidentially. April AI coffee morning; recording and resources

SCONUL's April AI coffee morning looked at a comparison of different AI tools and what it means for information and AI literacy. Professor Gobinda Chowdhury, from University of Strathclyde, spoke about his recent experimentation with AI tools for an article published in the Journal of Information Literacy. He described the summarisation technique of GenAI as a paradigm shift for students and researchers but cautions that they are not a replacement for traditional scholarly tools, citing the changing nature of results at different times of day. The session also had a number of provocations, and the audience took up the mantle, debating concerns over paid-for tools and the growing inequity in the sector, the differing nature of AI policies and the dichotomy of employers looking for AI skills in recent graduates and students' concerns that they haven't mastered these required skills.
