## **COUNTER Release 5 Transition: A Community Call for Compliance**

We write as representatives of the international academic library community to urge library content providers to prioritise and expedite a transition to Release 5 of the COUNTER Code of Practice, which became effective in January 2019.

COUNTER's members contributed to the development of Release 5 (R5) of the COUNTER Code of Practice, which enables content providers to produce consistent, comparable and credible usage data for online content. This allows librarians and others to compare the usage data they receive, and to understand and demonstrate the value of the electronic resources to which they subscribe.

Those providers offering usage data solely under Release 4 of the Code of Practice are no longer COUNTER compliant. Compliant COUNTER Release 5 providers are listed on the COUNTER website. As a community that licenses content from a wide range of providers, COUNTER Release 5 compliance by all our providers is critical to informing decisions and stewardship of our funds.

Release 5 reduces the complexity of the Code of Practice and offers a number of improvements:

- Greater consistency in report layout and between different formats
- More consistency in vocabulary and terminology
- Fewer reports and metric types but greater flexibility to compare and combine
- Flexibility to access standard reports that meet common use cases in addition to reports that can be filtered to meet highly specific use cases

We recognise the challenges in supporting compliance and acknowledge that, for some, scheduling the work required for transition has been a challenge. However, we encourage all providers to recognise obligations to their customers and request implementation of Release 5 as soon as possible to regain COUNTER compliant status, a requirement detailed in many content agreements.

As soon as possible, non-compliant providers should:

- 1. Prioritise development of a COUNTER 5 service and communicate publicly your expected service release date

- 3. Schedule a COUNTER audit

If you are currently developing a service but not yet COUNTER Release 5 compliant, there are free resources to support you in the transition, including the COUNTER R5 validation tool, available here: <a href="https://www.projectcounter.org/validation-tool-preview/">https://www.projectcounter.org/validation-tool-preview/</a>

Several community-founded initiatives and services have developed to support libraries in working with COUNTER-compliant usage data, including Jisc's well-established JUSP service and the more nascent international CC-PLUS initiative. Jisc's JUSP service collects COUNTER usage data from providers on behalf of participating libraries and presents those statistics for viewing via an online portal. The CC-PLUS project is modelled on JUSP, and is actively developing a free, open source consortial platform for harvesting, storing, and analysing this usage data at scale. The JUSP and CC-PLUS teams, strong advocates for standards-based usage data, recognise the value of shared approaches to development and have been working with a broad range of suppliers to support their move to R5.
